

Amputation After A Louisiana Car Accident

Evidence + Documentation Toolkit (Print-Friendly)

This toolkit helps you organize proof after a traumatic amputation in a car accident. It focuses on preserving evidence early, building a clear timeline, and reducing common insurance proof gaps.

First 72 Hours: Evidence You Can Still Control

- Get the crash report number and the responding agency name.
- Photograph the vehicle from every side before it is moved or repaired.
- Photograph visible injuries and the bandage/wound care setup (only what you are comfortable documenting).
- Save clothing, shoes, and personal items from the crash in a clean bag.
- Write down witness names, phone numbers, and what they saw in a few lines.
- Start a simple symptoms + function log (sleep, walking, transfers, balance, work limits).

Medical Records That Usually Matter

- EMS/paramedic report and emergency department triage note.
- Operative report, surgeon consult notes, and imaging summaries.
- Hospital discharge instructions, medications list, and follow-up plan.
- Wound care notes, infection monitoring, and any revision procedures.
- Physical therapy, occupational therapy, and prosthetics evaluations.

Common Proof Gap → Quick Fix

Defense Theme	Record That Helps
"You're better now."	Use a function log + therapy notes that show limits over time.
"It was pre-existing."	Collect prior records to show baseline function before the crash.
"Future care is a guess."	Get a written care plan from rehab/prosthetics providers.

Defense Vs Evidence	
Amputation After A Car Crash	
Common Defense	Evidence Anchor
Low impact so injury couldn't happen	Crash photos + vehicle data EMS/ER records Surgeon op note
No seat belt so you caused your own harm	Police report belt marks + airbag data witness statements
You waited or missed follow-ups	Discharge plan clinic notes PT/prosthetics pain journal
It was pre-existing or limited	Prior records before/after function videos doctor narrative
Future needs are "guesses" too expensive	Written care plan rehab evaluation prosthetic quotes work impact proof
