

Can You Sue After a Louisiana Car Accident If You Aren't Hurt?

Printable evidence + paperwork toolkit (Updated March 2, 2026)

Quick Answer

Yes. Even without injuries, you may have a claim for property damage, loss of use, and out-of-pocket costs. The key is building a clean record before repairs and paperwork change the facts.

First 72 Hours Checklist

- Take a full photo set (wide + close-up) of both vehicles, plates, and the scene.
- Write down the report number, agency, and the responding officer's name if available.
- Save the first estimate and ask the shop to keep repair notes and supplements.
- Start a call/email log with dates, names, and what was said.
- Keep all towing, storage, rental, and transportation receipts in one folder.
- Do not sign a broad release until you confirm exactly what it covers.
